The Tribunal is a women-directed and women-centered justice and advocacy initiative. Judges will hear testimony from several women of Burma who will share their personal stories of surviving human rights violations and crimes under military rule in Burma. Their voices, and the findings and recommendations of the judges, will be directed to the Burmese regime and the international community. The Tribunal will provide a powerful spotlight on the oppression of women of Burma in order to support the development of a just and peaceful Burma.



Since 1999, the Women's League of Burma, an umbrella organization comprising thirteen women's organizations of twelve different ethnic backgrounds from Burma, has worked for the advancement of the status of women towards a peaceful and just society.
